

Changes in the Club Committee.

THE AGM IN BRIEF.

The AGM was held on Monday April 27th at Trinity Church Golders Green at 7pm.

Chairman Brian welcomed the 119 attendant members and thanked them for braving the inclement weather. Apologies had been received from a further 44.

In his report he told members that the BBC had withdrawn the Club's grant, banned the use of a table by Club representatives and the sale of Orchestra's CDs, and had indicated that from July the Club would have its allocation of tickets reduced. He was still awaiting confirmation from Al Booth, the head of Production, what the revised allocation would be.

Over 100 Members had enjoyed the Concert at Finchley, featuring Richard Baker, Robin Stapleton and Nigel Blomiley. A further 5 Letchworth "Afternoon Out" had taken place and more were planned for this year. To celebrate the Club's 25th Anniversary, the Orchestra were going to record a CD which would be free to all Club Members.

The Treasurer presented the Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December 2008. Income of £12,231.61 had exceeded expenditure of £8,897.04 by £3,347.57 Membership stood at 107 single plus 301 joint Members – a total of 709. Subscription rates would not be increasing. Members were reminded to renew their subscriptions promptly.

Election of Committee:

Esther Lawrence had tended her resignation at an earlier meeting, and was presented with a bouquet in acknowledgement of her years of catering at Club parties.



Paul Taylor had declined to stand for re-election. All other members were re elected Stephen Greenhalgh was welcomed to the committee for the purpose of setting up a website for the Club, and gave a brief talk.

Unfortunately the Orchestra's representative Marcus Broome had been unable to attend to give his resume of the Orchestra's year and future arrangements, as his daughter was unwell. Andrew Connolly, the Orchestra's General Manager - although expected - failed to attend, so after a brief interval the guest speaker **Kate Moore** took the stage.



Kate is a brilliant teacher and soon had the enthralled audience performing an impromptu Raga chorus, before talking of her early musical days dodging the hated piano lessons, and taking up the trumpet. Her despair at having received many rejections before successfully applying for the post at the BBC, would you believe 21 years ago!

She then explained the workings of the trumpet, demonstrating various techniques, and the correct way to breathe and blow, particularly when using a mute, which required much more effort, not to mention the possibility of it falling out in a quiet

passage, and the effects on the instrument of eating too much garlic! She enlightened the audience why there is often much laughter in the brass section...but that's another story!

Needless to say there were many questions from the floor, after which Kate was presented with her favourite tipple.



If you missed this AGM, then we hope to see you at next years. As you gather it's not all dreary reports!

Don't forget to enclose stamped addressed envelopes for concerts applied for. In the event of a concert being cancelled, we will keep your envelopes for use when an extra concert is arranged.

BE EARLY

We have heard from several members who, despite having tickets, were unable to get into the Mermaid Theatre for FNIMN. Please remember that having a ticket does not guarantee entry, particularly when there are "superstars" appearing. Get there early to avoid disappointment. Bar is open from 6.30 pm.

"SPECIALS"

From time to time some FNIMN are re-classified as "Specials"—when a pop-star is appearing. When this happens, the Club does NOT receive ANY tickets, neither is the Ticket Unit involved. CLUB OUTINGS

Afternoon Out:

Afternoons in Letchworth: Carvery lunch and Benslow Music recitals.

Our first for the year was held on March 9th a bright but breezy day. 32 members enjoyed the Carvery Lunch and excellent recital by the accomplished clarinettist Nadia Wilson, a woodwind school teacher, who performed works by Aaron Copland, Joseph Horovitz, Arthur Benjamin and André Messager, accompanied at the piano-with some furious page turning - by Marcus Andrews, Professor of Music at Blackheath Conservatoire.

To round off the afternoon there were mouth-watering scones and fruit cake for tea. Everyone agreed it was another successful day.

On 11th May, 41 people converged on the Broadway from 8 counties – yes really!

Matthew was the chef of the day and everyone enjoyed their meals as always. The Benslow recital was performed by the London Myriad Ensemble a professional chamber group consisting of flute, oboe, clarinet, horn, bassoon and bass clarinet. Their programme of "Sextet"by Jean Françaix, "Mládi"by Leoš Janácek and a first performance of a work by Julian Broughton entitled "Natural Light"enthralled the audience.

Our final one for the season on 8th June attracted 28 Members. We thought our run of fine Mondays had come to an end, but it brightened up in good time! Chef David back in charge ensured everyone was replete. The convoy to Benslow had to be re-routed due to roadworks, but nobody got lost, although a few balloons did! The concert featured Cunningham Quintet playing Schubert's "The Trout", and there was an extra special treat for teafresh Strawberry and Cream scones.



We have now arranged 29 Afternoons Out at Letchworth but the hunger for music and food is still very strong out there!

For the benefit of our newer members who do not know about it, an "Afternoon Out" consists of a visit to North Hertfordshire for a Carvery lunch, dessert and coffee served in the ballroom, followed by a visit to a music college for a concert and home-made cakes and tea. The whole function lasts from 12 noon to 5pm and costs £20.50 per head.

THE CONCERT GOERS.

Barnet Symphony Orchestra performed its first concert for 2009 on Sunday 22nd March, at St John's Church Friern Barnet Road N11.

Martin Loveday, as always, conducted the 59 musicians led by Philip Gibson. More familiar CO faces included Liz Driscoll, Clive Hobday and Peter Beament. This was a far lighter concert than usual, starting with Khachaturian: "Masquerade Suite", Milhaud's "Scaramouche", Piazzola's "Oblivion", Lutoslawski's "Little Suite" and finally Sibelius' "Karelia Overture and Suite". We don't often hear this popular work in its entirety, mores the pity!

We often ask members of the Orchestra to let us know when they are performing recitals and concerts away from the BBC, as we are always happy to support them. We report these and so give other members the opportunity to share some delightful informal evenings.

It was at a FN at Old Street that Benjamin Hughes the Principal cellist told us simply "6.30 next Sunday at Kings Place". Well of course this was an opportunity not to be missed. We didn't know quite what to expect, well it did sound rather unlikely – A Chamber Concert at 6.30 on an April Sunday evening in Kings Cross?....However.

Kings Place is London's newest Concert Hall, situated in York Road, which runs alongside Kings Cross Station, a huge glass and concrete building rather incongruous in a street otherwise unchanged for aeons, - it was featured on Sean Rafferty's "In Tune" programme when it opened last Autumn, and hails a new and exciting chapter in the history of the London Chamber Music Society. The Society can trace its origins back to 1870 when regular Sunday Concerts first attracted Victorian Londoners.

The interior of this building is spectacular. The atrium is light and spacious with a bar and patisserie and snacks counter and plenty of informal seating. There are Galleries of paintings and sculptures. The Rotunda restaurant has riverside views and al fresco seating, whilst the bar offers an all day à la carte menu serving everything from breakfast to dinner. Everywhere the marble flooring is embedded with the finest assortment of fossils seen outside of the Natural History Museum, it almost seems wrong to walk on it!

The two purpose built Concert Halls are situated on the lower floor which is accessed by lift or escalator. Each has a gently sloping floor to ensure

perfect sight and sound from every seat, sheer delight for disabled folk—But we were not there to admire the premises! However it really is well worth a visit.

Settling into our comfy seats we were surprised to see how quickly the Hall filled up, very few of the 420 seats were not taken. And so to the concert which featured *FIBONACCI SEQUENCE*. Founded in 1994 by its artistic director, pianist Kathron Sturrock, it is now well established as one of Britain's foremost chamber ensembles.

This concert featured Ileana Ruhemann (flute) Benjamin Nabarro (violin) Yuko Inoue (viola) Benjamin Hughes (cello) and Kathron Sturrock (piano). The programme was Haydn Trio in G major (flute, cello and piano), a premier performance of a Quartet in C minor for piano and strings, by Frank Bridge, Martinu's Trio for flute viola and piano, John Ireland's Trio No2 (violin, cello and piano), and finally Mozart's Flute Quartet No 1 in D major.

A superb evening, thanks for mentioning it Benjamin!

Leader Peter Bussereau, and conducted by David Beaman, this concert consisted of Haydn's powerful "Trauer" Symphony, Mozart's violin concerto in A, Handel's "Arrival of the Queen of Sheba", Barber's "Adagio for Strings", Boyce's Symphony No2, and the Romanian Dances of Bela Bartok.

It was another Evening with Peter Bussereau and Wing Yun Wu on 16th May at St Luke's Church, Langley Way, Watford. This is just half a mile down the road from the Colosseum, so it was not surprising to see a few Club members in the audience. (But it is a huge church and can easily accommodate many more of you!) CD REVIEWS

Despite the fact we are no longer allowed to sell CDs at concerts, we shall continue to keep you informed about recent new releases from the BBC Concert Orchestra. The past year has been a very sad one for British music with the death of 3 great conductors – Vernon Handley, Richard Hickox and most recently Sir Edward Downes.

Good Friday this year saw the passing of Richard Arnell a composer whose music made a considerable

impact in the 1940s and 50s, but who became unfashionable in the face of avant-garde trendiness. In the last Soirées Musicales, I mentioned the release of a CD of some of his ballet scores with the CO, and now the ever enterprising people at Dutton have issued another (CDLX 7227). This contains 2 ballet scores "Punch and the Child"1947, and "Harlequin In April"1951, written for the Festival Of Britain. This disc is completed with Arnell's 2nd Violin Concerto, never played in this country until this recording with the excellent soloist Lorraine McAslan. These recordings, along with the Symphonies with the RSNO all conducted by Martin Yates reveal Arnell to be a major figure of his time with a personal style and something strong to say.

All lovers of English music owe such a debt to the Dutton Label for unearthing so much we never hear otherwise. CDLX7216 is a case in point. 2 Viola Concertos, one by Stanley Bate and one from William Henry Bell both feature soloist Roger Chase and conducting is our own Stephen Bell, If you enjoy Vaughan Williams represented here by his "Romance", you will enjoy the rest.

David Lloyd Jones takes up the baton on Dutton CDLX7226 for more discoveries, this time some of the early music of Frederick Delius. "Hiawatha" a Tone poem followed by "Florida Suite", written after his 2 year stay in America in 1888, but has had to wait until now for a first performance. The Suite for violin was written in the same year but only had to wait till 1984 for a performance! The soloist here is Philippe Graffin who

also features in the Double Concerto for Viola, Violin and Orchestra with Sarah-Jane Bradley.

And so to Dutton CDLX7228 entitled "Her Song" and featuring Orchestral songs and Arias from the likes of Elgar, Ireland, Parry and Eric Gritton – Grandfather of the soloist Susan Gritton, Soprano. Susan won the Kathleen Ferrier Award in 1994 and is recognised as one of the finest singers of her generation, As one whose tastes often lie in non vocal music, I have to say I really enjoyed this offering with superb playing from the Orchestra under Martyn Brabbins.

Finally in complete contrast and to demonstrate the unique gift of the BBC CO – versatility! – the show they gave with the band "Elbow"from Abbey Road. This was broadcast on Radio2 and on the "Red Button"on BBCTV. We often complain about the pop gigs the Orchestra does but sometimes a gem does appear and this is one such. I cannot say it is Lehar or Novello but it does have a true quality of its own. The CD/DVD set issued by Polydor called "The Seldom Seen Kids" is a box set NOT available so I understand through normal outlets, but only from the Elbow website: http://www.myspace.com/Elbow.

I don't often disagree with Andrew Connolly, but to suggest that this sort of exercise has evolved from the 1950's and 1960's Light Music Festivals is not right in my opinion. Each is a separate entity in its own right. ENJOY BOTH!!

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MEMBERS REFLECTIONS.

After a recent concert at the Mermaid Theatre earlier this year, I began to think our BBC Concert Orchestra had merged with the BBC Big Band. As we took our seats and viewed the orchestra before us, I noticed an additional five saxophones seated behind the piano. As the pianist that evening was Andrew Vinter who at one time was the regular pianist for Big Band, I thought are the powers at the top of BBC trying to tell us something? In this uncertain climate, who knows?

However we very much enjoyed the concert as we have a wide musical taste from Big Bands to classical, Ellington to Elgar, and Rodgers to Rossini.

Then at a recording on 16th March at Watford we were treated to a more traditional FN. Conducted by Richard Balcombe and introduced by Ruthie Henshall with singers Faryl Smith (what a voice for a 13 year old!), John Owen Jones and a Welsh Youth Choir. The Orchestra performed works by Sidney Torch, Arthur Sullivan Eric Coates and Johann Strauss. True FNIMN - light music at its best. A special mention to Lindy Harris, her oboe solo in "the Watermill" was truly delightful. A medley of Richard Rodgers music, and the Choir's songs from the "Lion King" concluded a great evening.

Two different but both enjoyable concerts, it was a privilege to be there. Clive Busby.

As we finish the programmes in the "Big Yellow Book" for the year we would just like to reflect on the wonderful hours of pleasure we have had from the BBC CO and the variety of performance, too.

We started the year at Proms In The Park with highlights from "Maestro", passed on to Ultimate Classics, American Light Music, Discovering Music, Christmas Classics, Fabulous Fun Day at Watford (always a special delight) FNIMN in glorious abundance and the more unusual performances at QEH. How can we forget the sounds of the Orchestra playing in the dark and Bob Cooper singing, plus a sight that will stay in my memory forever – the bare toes of some of the male members of the Orchestra at Kurt Weill's "Lost In The Stars"!!

MUSIC IN OUR LIVES

Club Members Shirley and Bernard Ecker reflect on how music entered their own and their family lives.

When Jenny suggested I could write an article for the Magazine, I just laughed. What do I know about music that would interest the readers of Soirées Musicales? I could write about my many humorous experiences in the hotel management, perhaps a few words about my National Service in the RAF, or even at a push something on the railways in the Eastern counties – but music? Never!!

Then having given it a bit more thought my wife Shirley and I then pondered on the way music has touched our lives from schooldays until the present time, in all sorts of ways.

Shirley and her family are far more musical than my forebears. She started to learn the piano at age 5 and continued until Grade 6 (RAM). She was a member of the famous Walthamstow High School Choir, who on several occasions performed on BBC radio including Children's Hour. Whilst her father showed no musical talent, her untrained mother could play the piano by ear and could pick out a melody whether classical or popular with great ease and skill.

Having said that about her father, his elder brother David was a professional violinist and played with the Albert Sandler Orchestra in his younger days before leading his own small "restaurant quintet"during the late forties and fifties. David married a saxophone player who was a member of the Ivy Benson All Girls Band. Needless to say their daughter was musical and also played the saxophone as well as the clarinet professionally. She in turn married a jazz drummer – a truly self contained musical family.

My interest in classical music began at infants school in Norwich, when on wet and cold days, for exercise the class would march around the school hall to the strains of the "Slow March from Aida" (and other popular marching tunes) played on the teacher's wind up HMV portable gramophone. As it so happened I worked some 30 years later for the parent company of HMV, namely EMI Limited.

At Grammar school in Norwich, I studied music for 3 years, alas without the opportunity to play any instruments, although my father could scrape a tune on a violin, and he did try to encourage me to play – but football and cricket were much preferred. Incidentally our music teacher was named Mr Doe (no his forename wasn't Ray).

What really set me on the road of appreciating classical music while at school was Benjamin Britten's "Young persons Guide To The Orchestra", which we listened to initially an LP record , later saw it on film and finally a live performance by the BBC Symphony Orchestra, I believe conducted by Sir Malcolm Sargeant at St Andrews Hall in Norwich, to which local schools attended in large numbers.

Actually my paternal Grandmother's maiden name was Sandler and that has set me on a genealogy trail to see whether I'm related to the aforementioned Albert Sandler.

Shirley's musical connections continue with the brother of her maternal grandfather who emigrated from London to the US in 1908, married and had a son Alvin Morris (Shirley's 2nd cousin). On leaving school Alvin embarked on an instrumental career playing the saxophone in several dance bands including Isham Jones where he played alongside the then little known Woody Herman.

Alvin Morris gradually became the band's vocalist and soon the singing took over from the sax playing. With it went the name a change of name to Tony Martin. As well as a broadcaster and recording star, he appeared in many films together with the like of the Marx Brothers, James Stewart, Lana Turner and Judy Garland. His first marriage to Alice Faye didn't last long because according to Tony she thought more of her pet dog than her husband. In 1948 he married dancer / actress Cyd Carisse who only died last year having been married over 60 years. Cyd on a visit to London gave Shirley a pair of ballet shoes she had worn in a film. At age 97 Tony Martin still entertains at Old peoples homes in Beverley Hills, Hollywood.

Our son in law shares the same surname as his distant cousin George Fierstone, the famous jazz drummer who played with the Skyrockets Orchestra (formerly the RAF Dance Band during WW2) and had accompanied Ella Fitzgerald and Frank Sinatra during shows at the London Palladium.

Joel our eldest grandson is learning the flute – so watch out James Galway! Finally our musical interest continued when we first attended a recording of FNIMN at the Golders Green Hippodrome about 11 years ago, joining the membership of the BBC CO Club a year later – and have thoroughly enjoyed every concert attended and other Club events ever since. © 2009 Bernard Ecker.

It is a great shame that Marilyn Hill-Smith has not featured in FNIMN for several years now, although she can still be heard occasionally on "Melodies For You". We have reported concerts Marilyn has done at Stevenage Theatre in previous editions of Soirées, but members often ask what she is doing these days. Here she writes about her recent cruise on "Oriana".

Silver Jubilee P&O Music Cruise



We set sail on Oriana at 17.30 on Monday 20 April and, having quaffed a small glass of celebratory champagne on deck, as we watched the band on Southampton's dockside fade into the distance, the "Music Festival at Sea" team met up in the cabin of our manager Stephannie Williams. First and foremost was host Richard Baker, along with his wife Margaret – a wonderful couple, of whom I have grown very fond, since the first cruise we enjoyed together 24 years ago.

My fellow singers were beautiful mezzo soprano Kate Woolveridge, tenor Ben Segal and Owen Webb, all new to cruising. Our concerts were accompanied by Ingrid Surgenor, who will be known to viewers of the Cardiff Singer of the Year as their official accompanist until recently.

Also on the team were superb clarinettist Angela Malsbury with her delightful pianist husband David Pettit, the virtuoso violinist Vanya Milanova and concert pianist Margaret Fingerhut. Sadly, poor Margaret never quite found her sea-legs and felt unwell for much of the cruise. We did have a couple of "lumpy"nights, but I'm pleased to say I felt fine throughout. I was often sick at sea in the past – not ideal for a performer –



but my problems ended after I visited a hypnotherapist, and I now go for a top-up session before every cruise.

Over the course of our 16 days on Oriana, we performed 5 morning concerts on days when we were at sea, and these required each of us to provide just a couple of items each. My repertoire included some Delius, Gilbert and Sullivan and Ivor Novello. We visited seven Mediterranean ports and, since a lot of passengers leave the ship and go on coach excursions, there are seldom concerts during port days. We did have to fit in rehearsals, of course, but the ship did not usually set sail until about 18.00, so we had time to see Malaga, Corfu, Dubrovnik, Messina, Naples, Cadiz and Civitavecchia (from here enjoying a wonderful day-trip to Rome).

There were other daytime concerts on sea-days, and for our offering, we singers put together "An afternoon in old Vienna" comprising operetta and Lieder. The instrumentalists gave more formal recitals, whilst Richard worked extremely hard: he delighted his audience with an amusing and informative talk about his career, hosted a "Desert Island Discs" session with the ship's Captain, and reminisced with Stephannie about the past 25 years of P & O music cruises, (the first having been hosted by the clarinettist Jack Brymer). In addition, Richard introduced all the concerts as well as hosting a quiz: all executed with his inimitable charm, efficiency and wit.

Most evening concerts have to be repeated, to accommodate different dining times. The singers were only involved in three of these programmes. Always included is a special Opera Gala which begins at 22.30 – the late start is to ensure that all passengers can attend, whether they have first or second sitting dinner. The theatre is always filled to capacity with guests in evening dress. We are directed each day as to the dress-code: formal, semi-formal or smart casual, the latter usually on port days, so passengers can feel relaxed after an exhausting day ashore.

For those of you who may not be familiar with life on board, one can actually eat 24 hours around. There are two formal large restaurants (providing breakfast, lunch, afternoon tea and dinner), a large buffet-style restaurant which is open from 6a.m. till 10p.m. (serving hot and cold food of every description), a small coffee shop, (which serves snacks whenever the buffet is not open) and two small speciality restaurants where, for a nominal extra charge one can enjoy superb grills or cuisine designed by Gary Rhodes. In addition there are three restful bar areas, a pub-style bar etc... With the exception of the pub, I am able to report that I have tried them all, and they are, without exception, excellent!

This is beginning to sound like a commercial for P&O cruises, but we did

FRIDAY NIGHT FLASHBACKS

As you know this club is 25 years old so I thought it might be interesting to find out what was happening a quarter of a century ago.

The BBC Concert Orchestra's conductors were many and varied in those days and included James Lockhart, Stanley Black, Kenneth Alwyn, Iain Sutherland and Nicholas Cleobury.

The guest singers included Geoffrey Chard, Forbes Robinson, Joan Savage, Marilyn Hill Smith, Cynthia Glover, Maryetta and Vernon Midgley.

Military bands were a regular feature in the eighties and included The Band Of The Scots Guards, The Central Band Of The Royal Air Force and The Metropolitan Police Band.

Pieces of music that were often played then but are seldom heard now were the well remembered tango "Jealousy", Robert Docker's "Tabarinage", Sidney Torch's "Trapeze Waltz" and Suppé's overture "Pique Dame".

One thing that was almost permanent at this time was the announcer. This was of course Robin Boyle (former president of this club). He did in fact present the programme for about 30 years. Happy Days!!
